be, it also provides even more opportunities for thieves, child molesters and con artists to take advantage of the innocent. The best weapon against them is us—the parents, the schools and the law. The Southern Shores Police Department, in conjunction with the Dare County School system and the help of NetSmartz, is coming to the classroom and teaching children about the dangers of the Internet. Multi-Use Pathway

The multi-use pathway should be back in one piece just in time for the summer. The path is there for walkers, joggers, bikers and skaters and we ask that you all use common courtesy while traveling the pathway. By town ordinance, there are **NO** motorized vehicles of any kind allowed on the pathway. Failure to comply with this ordinance will result in a \$50.00 fine!

Who Has the Right-of-Way at a Crosswalk?

This question has plagued many residents of Southern Shores after several crosswalks were installed on NC Hwy 12 last year. The law regarding pedestrian right-of-way at crosswalks according to the North Carolina General Statute is as follows:

§ 20-173. Pedestrians' right-of-way at crosswalks.

(a) Where traffic-control signals are not in place or in operation the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way,

slowing down or stopping if need be to so yield, to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at or near an intersection, except as otherwise provided in Part 11 of this Article.

(b) Whenever any vehicle is stopped at a marked crosswalk or at any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and

pass such stopped vehicle.

(c) The driver of a vehicle emerging from or entering an alley, building entrance, private road, or driveway shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian, or person riding a bicycle, approaching on any sidewalk or walkway extending across such alley, building entrance, road, or driveway. (1937, c. 407, s. 134; 1973, c. 1330, s. 32.)

Summer is on the way and with it comes a lot of beach goers



who will be using those crosswalks. Please allow them to cross the road as the law allows. Pedestrians beware!! The law is on your side but will not keep you from harm. Please use common sense and caution when crossing any busy street and do not assume that a car will stop for you. Let's make this a safe and happy summer.

Safety Tips for Seniors

Southern Shores is largely a retirement community and as people grow older, their chances of being victims of crime decrease dramatically. But a lifetime of experience coupled with the physical problems associated with aging often make older Americans fearful. Although they're on the lookout constantly for physical attack and burglary, they're not as alert to fraud and con games—in reality, the greatest crime threat to seniors' well being and trust. If you want to conquer fear and prevent crime, take these common-sense precautions...

BE ALERT WHEN OUT AND ABOUT

- Go with friends or family, not alone.
- Carry your purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket.
- Don't carry credit cards you don't need or large amounts of cash.

- Use direct deposit for Social Security and other regular checks.
- Whether you're a passenger or driver, keep car doors locked. Be particularly alert in parking lots and garages. Park near an entrance.
- Sit close to the driver or near the exit while riding the bus, train or subway.
- If someone or something makes you uneasy, trust your instincts and leave.

MAKE YOU HOME SAFE AND SECURE

- Install good locks on doors and windows. Use them! Don't hide keys in mailboxes and planters or under doormats. Instead, leave an extra set of keys with a neighbor or friend.
- Ask for photo identification from service or delivery people before letting them in. If you are the least

bit worried, call the company to verify.

- Be sure your street address number is large, clear of obstruction, and well lighted so police and other emergency personnel can find you home quickly.
- Consider a home alarm system that provides emergency monitoring for burglary, fire and medical emergencies.
